A little bird, flying high in the sky, spies something very beautiful below. She pokes, pecks, and makes a great noise to try and wake it up. Thinking it a very strange egg indeed, she sits upon it. A monkey, watching from a nearby tree, finds this very funny. A bird sitting on an orange. What follows is an original and whimsical tale of wonder, curiosity, and friendship told in the most simple of language and accompanied by delicately bold illustrations.

Roly-poly Egg

Splotch-a red, bug-eyed burst of a bird who fully resembles her name-is so overjoyed about the egg she laid (it's shiny blue with multicolored spots) that her branch shakes, and the egg falls. Via a dashed line, readers can follow the egg's trajectory as it rolls down Jemima giraffe's

neck, bounces off a zebra's hoof, and has several other narrow escapes before returning to Splotch, at which point it begins to crack. A flap at the end reveals a blue chick, whose cockeyed stare and shock of scribbly plumage only a mother could love.

The Cow That Went Oink

A simple, sensitive story that lends itself to creative dramatization, participation, and self-expression. A cow and a pig are laughed at because they aren't like the other farm animals. Through friendship and determination, they turn the situation around, and the story ends on a high note with both animals being different in a positive way. Since

Lionni's signature watercolors span the rainbow in this story of a chameleon who, while searching for his identity, finds a friend with whom he can share his changeable nature.

Follows the progress of a hungry little caterpillar as he eats his way through a varied and very large quantity of food until, full at last, he forms a cocoon around himself and goes to sleep.
