instead of being its creator. He was probably the first commercial seller of jigsaw puzzles.

Spilsbury was an eighteenth century British mapmaker who decided to create a product to help children learn world geography. To make his puzzle, he glued one of his maps to a piece of wood and then sawed the wood into pieces. He's thought to have used a handheld fret saw to cut the wood. Children

had to join the wood pieces in the correct arrangement to reform the map.

Spilsbury's puzzles were known as dissections and first appeared around 1760. Unlike the case in modern jigsaw puzzles, the pieces of a dissection weren't interlocking, so they separated easily. The dissections were expensive and could only be afforded by wealthy families.

The use of jigsaw puzzles gradually

spread to other school subjects besides geography. At first, the puzzles were used only as educational tools for children.

Around 1820, games for adults appeared.
